# Carroll Wins Wild One, 17-7

There was a wild baseball game at Carroll Stadium Wednesday night. There were 24 runs pushed across with Carroll staying unbeaten in three games with a 17-7 victory over St. Bernard's of Breda in a game called after five innings because of the 10-run rule.

The Bobcats, now 1-11 on the spring-summer season, jumped out to a 2-0 lead in the top of the first inning only to see Carroll tie it at two-all. The Tigers then went ahead 5-2 after two frames.

Dale Leslie's club came back in the fourth and grabbed a temporary 7-5 lead only to see Carroll make it 12-7 after four innings with a seven-run barrage and finishing it off in

the bottom of the fifth with five more runs.

"We played miserably," said Tiger coach Ted Edwards. "If we aren't better for Friday night's game with Perry, it will be a long night."

"It was our poorest effort of the season," added Edwards. "Defensively, we didn't do anything for three innings."

The only phase of the game that pleased the Carroll coach was hitting and his boys did plenty of that, banging out 11 hits with Ted Nam and winning pitcher Pete Marz being the slugging stars with three hits apiece.

Nam collected two triples and a single to drive home five runs. His triple in the first scored Rick Beyer who had walked. His triple in the second brought

home two more runs and he finished off an outstanding night with his two-run single in the fourth.

Marz, who relieved starting pitcher Lonnie Lehrkamp with two outs in the fourth, tripled home one run in the fourth and connected for a 392-foot double in the fifth that brought home a run. His double struck the top of the fence and stayed in the park, missing a home run by just inches.

No other Tigers collected more than one hit. Steve Sundermann, Jeff Petersen, Dan Sheehan, Tim Fredrickson and reserve Reggie Conrad all added hits with Conrad's being a double down the left field line in the fifth.

Rick Beyer, who started the

game at second base for Carroll, didn't get a hit, but scored three times as did Marz. He walked in the first, second and fourth innings and moved around.

The Bobcats' big hit in the game came in the fourth as John Koster ripped a two-run single to give his team a temporary 7-5 lead. Steve Schwabe led the Bobcats with two hits with Koster, Tom Koster, Tom Schwarzkopf and Steve Nieland each collecting one hit.

The Tigers went through three St. Bernard's pitchers with the starter Mark Gaffney taking the loss.

# New York Takes Fourth Straight

Now you see it, now you don't. Vic Harris didn't. Umpire Bill Deegan did and he had two words for Harris. They were, "You're out!"

Harris, the young Texas center fielder, probably had a few choice words of his own but they were surely unprintable after veteran New York shortstop Gene Michael embarrassed him with the hidden ball trick for the rally-killing third out in the fifth inning of the Yankees' 5-2 victory over the Rangers Wednesday night.

It was the Yanks' fourth consecutive victory and lifted them within one-half game of Detroit in the AL East.

The Baltimore Orioles bombed Chicago 14-4, slashing the slumping White Sox' lead in the American League West to just three percentage points over the Minnesota Twins, who swept a doubleheader from the Cleveland Indians, 7-3 in 15 innings and 13-9. Elsewhere, the California Angels downed the Detroit Tigers 7-4, the Boston Red Sox edged the Kansas City Royals 5-4 on Bob Montgomery's second home run of the game in the 10th inning and the Oakland A's battered the Milwaukee Brewers 11-1.

Sandy Alomar keyed a pair of two-run rallies with a single in the first inning and a triple in the second while Bill Singer and Dave Seils pitched the Angels to a 7-4 victory over the Tigers and Joe Coleman. Vada Pinson homered for the Angels.

Brooks Robinson and Earl Williams each homered and combined to drive in six runs as Baltimore's revived long-ball attack powered the Orioles over the slumping White Sox. The loss was the fifth straight for the Sox.

Robinson's first homer since May 1 and a sacrifice fly accounted for four runs while Williams hit his first homer since April 22, a two-run shot. Chicago's Dick Allen took over the

league lead with his 14th homer. Jim Holt slugged two home runs and Steve Braun added one in a 16-hit attack that carried Minnesota to its second-game victory over Cleveland and a sweep of the twin bill. A double error by shortstop Frank Duffy enabled Larry Hise to score the tie-breaking run in the 15th inning of the opener as the Twins scored four runs.

Bob Montgomery's second home run of the game—and the season—leading off the 10th inning lifted the Red Sox to a sweep of their three-game series with Kansas City. The Royals tied the score with two out in the ninth when Paul Schaal walked and designated hitter Jim Wohlford homered. Boston's designated hitter, Orlando Cepeda, also homered.

Reggie Jackson drove in five runs with one of three Oakland homers in the first inning and a double as the A's ended the Brewers' five-game winning streak.

# Bonds Triggers Giants by Bucs

That's quite a leadoff hitter the San Francisco Giants have—14 home runs, 60 runs scored and a .320 batting average.

You'd think that Bobby Bonds would bat third or fifth in the order with that kind of power. So does Bobby Bonds.

"I don't want to lead off, but I will if that's what everyone wants," said Bonds after pacing the Giants to a 9-7 decision over the Pittsburgh Pirates Wednesday night.

Bonds drilled four hits, including a leadoff homer in the first inning, drove in two runs and scored four times, to lead the Giants to their seventh straight National League victory.

In the other National League games, the Chicago Cubs defeated the Los Angeles Dodgers 6-4; the Atlanta Braves beat the Montreal Expos 5-3; the Houston Astros nipped the Philadelphia Phillies 4-3 and the St. Louis Cardinals scored a 6-3 decision over the San Diego Padres.

Jose Cardenal drove in three runs with a two-run homer and sacrifice fly in Chicago's victory

over Los Angeles. Dodger ace Don Sutton lost to the Cubs for the 15th time in 18 career decisions.

Sutton departed after four straight singles during a four-run Chicago sixth. The winner was Burt Hooton, 6-3, who needed ninth-inning relief help from Jack Aker after giving up a homer to Willie Davis in a three-run Dodger ninth. The save was Aker's 10th of the season.

Darrell Evans and Dave Johnson each slugged two-run homers and Phil Niekro and Danny Frisella combined on a four-hitter to lead Atlanta past Montreal.

Johnson's two-run shot in the eighth snapped a 3-3 tie for the winning runs.

Bob Watson's infield single in the 10th inning gave Houston its victory over Philadelphia. Pinch-hitter Jimmy Stewart triggered the Astros' winning rally with a walk off relief pitcher Barry Lersch. After Jimmy Wynn struck out, Roger Metzger singled Stewart to third.

Jesus Alou walked to load the bases before Watson singled home Stewart with the game-winning run.

Ted Simmons' third hit, a three-run homer, climaxed a five-run outburst in the fifth inning and red-hot St. Louis went on to beat San Diego behind Bob Gibson's five-hitter.

The Cardinals won their fifth straight game and 16th in the last 18. Gibson won his fourth game against six losses while loser Clay Kirby's record dropped to 2-6.
