

# Knights Whip Denison

DENISON — Jerry Starman came to the rescue for the second straight night and Jeff Hunter and George Neil supplied the power as Kuemper ran its record to 2-1 with a 7-1 triumph over the Monarchs here Friday.

Starman, who came on in relief of Dean Heisterkamp on Thursday at Storm Lake, save starting pitcher Steve Garbier against Denison, with a masterful 2-2/3 innings of relief pitching.

The Knights owned a 6-1 lead when Starman entered the game with bases loaded and only one out in the bottom of the fifth. He fanned pinch-hitter Rollie Wiebers and got Tom Johnson to pop out to end any threat.

He gave up a leadoff single to Bill Miller in the sixth, but that was all. He then retired the last five batters.

For the second night in a row, Hunter blasted a home run. It was only a solo shot as compared to his bases loaded one against Storm Lake. Neil added another homer for Lou Gale-

tich's club in the fourth that made it a 3-1 game at the time. Kuemper got off to a 2-0 lead in the first inning with the help of wildness from the Monarchs' pitcher Ron Swan.

Phil Baldus, who led the Knights with three of the team's six hits, led off with a single. After he stole second, Neil and Mark Heithoff walked to load the bases. Swan got John Heithoff on strikes, but walks to Garbier and Hunter brought home both runs.

Denison got its lone run in the second as a bases loaded walk to Swan brought home Tom Johnson who had earlier collected one of three hits off Garbier.

Denison's only other serious threat in the game came in the fifth, but Starman cooled things then.

Garbier, who got the victory, went 4 1/2 innings, but got into trouble with six walks. He struck out two.

The Knights will try to make it three straight when they en-

tertain Jefferson in a game Monday night at 8 p.m. It will be the Midwest Conference opener for both teams.

Denison's junior varsity stayed unbeaten in the preliminary game, winning 8-3, in a game called after five innings.

Kuemper picked up all of its runs on Craig Bellinghausen's three-run homer.

### Entries for 4-H Dairy Contest Due

To be eligible for the contest, the cows entered by 4-H members must have completed a 305-day lactation period by the entry date.

Entry in this contest is required for 4-H members planning to enter the Iowa State Fair show, Millender added. A 4-H member must obtain an entry blank and production form from his county extension office when the cow freshens in order to enter the contest. At the end of the cow's 305-day record, the member should fill out the questionnaire and return it to the county office.

Cows may be entered in the Dairy Herd Improvement Association section or the owner-sampler section.
