Perry shutout Carroll, 11-0. in baseball Wednesday night at Carroll Stadium, ending the Tigers' three-game winning streak and spoiling Ted Edwards' club Midwest Conference opener.

The Bluejays, now 3-5 on the year and loser to five Des Moines schools, pushed across eight runs in the first four innings and ended things in the sixth with another three runs putting the 10-run into effect.


