

# Carroll Breaks Jinx

LAKE CITY — The Carroll Tigers broke the Lake City diamond jinx and handed the Eagles a 9-5 setback here Friday night.

Carroll Coach Ted Edwards said it had been "a long time" since the Tigers had downed Lake City on their own field. Behind the 11-strike out pitching arm of Lonnie Lehrkamp and the five-RBI bat of Eric Siemer the Tigers did it this year.

The win evened Carroll's Midwest Conference record at 1-1 and bettered their overall mark to 4-3. Lake City dropped to 1-6 and 0-3.

The Tigers jumped off to a 3-0 lead in the top half of the first, but the hosts closed the gap to a single run after their first chance at bat.

Carroll's first-inning runs came off the bat of Siemer, who cracked a three-run home

run. In the Tiger second, a walk to Tom Reiman and singles by Todd Buck and Ted Nam set the score at 5-2.

The next score was an unearned run by Lake City in the fifth.

Carroll came back in the seventh, however, and tallied four runs on a pair of RBIs each by Siemer and Todd Pettitt. Lake City could manage only two runs in their half of the frame to give Carroll their final four-run win.

Lehrkamp went all the way on the mound for the Tigers. He gave up two earned runs, five hits and four bases on balls.

Pettitt, Nam Pete Marz and Ron Bernholtz each collected two hits for Carroll. Dan Conrad did the same for the hosts.

Carroll faces Kuemper Monday night at Carroll diamond in the next outing for the Tigers. Game time is 8 p.m. for the conference clash.

The Tigers will try to equal Johnson's performance Monday night, as all nine Carroll starters managed hits against Lake City. Everyone who batted reached base.

# Knights Nip Jeff, 3-2

John Heithoff's two-out single in the bottom of the seventh inning gave Kuemper a 3-2 victory over Jefferson here Friday night at Carroll Stadium.

With one out, Russ Rupiper walked off Ram pitcher Chris Blackburn, but was forced out at second base on a ground ball by Mark Hermesen.

Then Jeff Hunter, batting for Larry McLellan, lined a bad-hop double down the left field line to put runners at second and third. Then Heithoff delivered the winning blow.

The victory evened the Knights' overall mark at 2-2 and gave them a 2-0 record in Midwest Conference play, heading into Monday night's game with Carroll, a winner over Lake City Friday night.

Mike Gute, in his first appearance of the year, went the distance for Lou Galetich.

The tall righthander scattered six hits and struck out seven.

The Knights jumped off to a

2-0 lead after three innings as Gute led off the third with a walk.

Tom Nurse, batting next, forced out Gute, but catcher Joe Roetker reached on an infield hit.

With Nurse on third and Roetker on first, the Knights tried a delayed double steal that paid off with Nurse scoring to make it 1-0.

Rupiper then singled to right, scoring Roetker for a 2-0 lead.

The Rams tied things up in the fifth as Sorenson batting for Bill Ganoe walked.

Nick Wand, the next batter, was safe on a bunt, putting runners at first and second.

Then Blackburn laid down a perfect sacrifice bunt to move up Sorenson and Wand to second and third.

Ed Whitner then hit a ground ball to Kuemper third baseman Tom Nurse. On the play, Sorenson tried to score and in a rundown Nurse tagged him out.

But Bob Tuhn singled to

score Wand to make it 2-1. The second run came home as the throw to the plate on Tuhn's single went by catcher Joe Roetker.

Even though Blackburn gave up 10 hits, the Ram hurler fanned 10 Knights and walked only two.

Kuemper's Joe Roetker and Heithoff managed two hits in the winning cause.

Kuemper also took the junior varsity game, 7-4, as Mark Hermesen got the victory with relief help from Alan Oswald.

Craig Bellinghausen and Marty Thelen led the Knights with three and two hits respectively.

# Fitting Series Climax: Southern Cal vs. Miami

By DAN EVEN AP Sports Writer OMAHA, Neb. (AP)—The 28th College World Series will

have a fitting climax: old guard—Southern California—against top-rated challenger—Miami.

Southern California, 49-20, earned a chance for an unprecedented fifth straight title and 10th over-all by ousting Southern Illinois 7-2 Friday night.

"We just have to play our ball game to beat Miami," said Southern California Coach Rod Dedeaux. "They don't make mistakes, and don't beat themselves. We saw that in our first meeting."

Miami, 51-10, handed Southern California its only defeat of the double-elimination tournament last Wednesday, taking a 5-3 decision thanks to a late four-run rally.

"We've been here before so we know what has to be done," continued Dedeaux. "Of course it will be a big asset that we have played in the finals before."

"Our record in the finals is 9-1, so we have something going for us. Our players think they can win. We are not cocky, but we are confident."

Miami drew the bye after three teams were left with one defeat, and Hurricane Coach Ron Fraser feels the extra day of rest will help in the crucial pitching department.

"They have had their pitching problems," said Fraser. "But there experience in the finals will make it an even contest."

First-time series qualifier Miami will pitch sophomore righthander Stan Jakubowski, 16-2, against Southern California.

"He has done the job for us so far," said Fraser. "He's won two series games, and one with only two days rest."

Jakubowski has pitched two complete games and surrendered only two earned runs.

A five-run first inning that featured two walks, three hits and a costly error started Southern California rolling Friday night, and Mark Barr took it from there.

The senior righthander gave up nine hits, but won his fourth straight series game over two years. Three double plays smothered Southern Illinois' comeback chances.

"We never hit with men on base during the whole tournament, and tonight it not only cost us a game, but a shot at the title," said Southern Illinois Coach Richard "Itchy" Jones.

The convention voted to give a unanimous ballot in commending Governor Robert Ray, Lt. Governor Arthur A. Neu and State Representative W. R. Ferguson.

A resolution from the floor recommending research into methods of providing funding for public facilities other than through property tax was also approved.

The delegates also approved a resolution from the floor to go on record as opposing "any attempt to grant amnesty or freedom from prosecution to those men who, either by illegally avoiding the draft or deserting from the armed forces, failed to fulfill their military obligation to the U.S."

A third resolution from the floor, urging stronger methods by state and federal governments in controlling inflation, was also adopted.

(Continued From Page 1) employers must provide meaningful work and allow a staff counselor to speak with the young employee during office hours. The sponsoring government agency carries insurance for the workers.

Another aspect of the program is a full-time counselor to assist the students with occupational and personal problems. Frank Hermesen, Holy Spirit School guidance head, is filling the position this summer. An evaluation sheet which the supervisor fills out along with time cards aids in helping the employees with problems on the job.

"We pretty well get to know the kids," Martin said. Neighborhood Youth Corps is an on-going program, the director said. About 100 persons are expected to retain their jobs on a part-time basis during the school year. Planning for the summer program usually begins in December, after the Community Opportunities office has been informed of the funds available.
