

What Credit

Law Means

to Consumer DES MOINES, Iowa (AP)— The 114-page consumer credit law which goes into effect Monday will affect every Iowan who uses a credit card, buys a washing machine or

borrows money at a bank. But what do the main provisions of the bill mean to the average consumer?

The measure raises the maximum annual interest rates on retail revolving charge accounts from 9 per cent to 18 per cent on balances up to \$500.

This means that Carl Consumer, who has credit cards for three department stores and two oil companies, will pay up to 18 per cent a year, or 1½ per cent a month, on the part of his bills he hasn't paid.

But if any of his bills are larger than \$500, he gets a break. The company can charge him a maximum of only 15 per cent a year, or 11/4 per cent a month. The present limit is 9 per cent on any amount.

If Mrs. Consumer's washing machine goes on the blink, and she gets credit to buy a new one, another provision of the law comes into play. Retailers can charge up to

15 per cent annually on closed-end retail credit contracts for single purchases, such as Mrs. Consumer's washing machine. The current maximum is 9 per

Mr. Consumer decides he needs a new roof on his house and gets a home improvement (installment) loan from a savings and loan association. Under present law, savings

and loans, which have add-ons and discounts plus basic interest, can charge a maximum of more than 17 per cent interest
