

Carroll Wins Finale

Carroll High's baseball team closed out its regular season Friday night by putting the season's second blemish on Lake View-Auburn's record.

The 6-1 win set the stage for sectional play, which opens Monday, and raised the Tigers record to 8-9. Visiting Lake View dropped to 10-2, with their losses coming in the first and last games of the season.

The other team that beat Lake View—Breda—will be Carroll's first tournament opponent Monday night at 8 p.m. in the second game of a sectional doubleheader at Carroll Stadium.

The regular season finale was not an easy one for pitcher Lonnie Lehrkamp and the Tigers.

At least two batters reached base in each of the first six innings. The only easy frame Lehrkamp had was the seventh, when he struck out a batter, cut one down at first and forced the third batter to fly out to first.

A pair of Tiger double plays helped Lehrkamp out.

The first came in the opening inning with a runner on second, one run already across and one out. Lake View pitcher Kevin Schultz hit a grounder to Todd Pettitt at shortstop, who tossed him out at first. First baseman Jeff Petersen caught Lake View runner Don Pick at third with a quick throw to Tom Reiter.

The next three innings Lehrkamp got the third out with two runners on base.

The second double play, in the fifth, ended a potentially dangerous situation for the Tigers.

After the first two Lake View batters reached base and the third fled out, Craig Johnson hit a shot back to the box and Lehrkamp fired to Reiter at third, cutting down one runner. Reiter threw Petersen to chop down the batter and get the Tigers out of the inning.

Offensively, Carroll netted only four hits, but was aided

by three Lake View errors and one passed ball.

The hosts picked up their first score in the first when Todd Buck drew a walk and was batted in on Pete Marz's triple. Marz scored on an error.

Petersen tallied on a passed ball in the second after belting a triple.

Carroll came up with three runs in the sixth on a pair of hits and another error.

Petersen was walked out then scored on Reiter's double. Although Reiter was thrown out later at third, Tom Reiter and Buck scored on the error.

Weather May Cost Farmers \$100 Million

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP)—The inclement weather during May and June may cost Iowa farmers over \$100 million dollars, says Iowa Secretary of Agriculture Robert Lounsbury.

"I don't want to be an alarmist," he said, "but the cash market loss may be over \$100 million."

Lounsbury said Friday that 580,000 acres of row crop has either been abandoned or shifted to less profitable crops such as late planted beans or forages.

He said in March that Iowa farmers intended to plant 13.2 million acres total corn but as of July 11, that total has dropped to 13 million.

The farmers also intended to plant 7.5 million acres of soybeans but now have settled for 7.12 million acres, for a total row crop drop of 580,000 acres.

Earlier, Wilson T. Moon, state soil conservationist, estimated that 570,000 acres would not produce corn or beans this year because of storm losses.

Lounsbury had estimated the loss could go as high as 750,000 acres, if weather conditions are less than ideal for the remainder of the growing season.

In estimating the potential market loss, Lounsbury used conservative figures—acreage yields of 90 bushels for corn and 30 bushels for soybeans and per bushel market prices of \$2 corn and \$6 soybeans.

That spells out a market loss of \$180 per acre for both corn and soybeans.

Lounsbury said multiplying this figure by 580,000 acres gives a conservative cash market loss of \$104,400,000.

No Rise in Fair Tickets

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP)—Admission prices for this year's Iowa State Fair will not be raised from last year's prices, said Fair Secretary Ken Fulk.

General admission to "The Discoverers" fair, Aug. 16-25, remains at \$1.50 for 13 and older, 50 cents for six through 12 and free for five and younger.

On Aug. 19 and 23, children 16 and under will be admitted free and will be permitted to attend the afternoon auto thrill show Aug. 19 at the grandstand at no charge. On Youth Day, Aug. 25, youth in an authorized uniform (Scout, Campfire, 4-H, FFA, etc.) will be admitted free.

"I'm averaging 33 a round now, and you can't win with that," he added. "Take today. I hit about five putts that just skirted the cup."

"But that's the way it goes. If you've got all those down, you'd go a round in 60—and we both know that's not possible."

about 2 p.m. Thursday. The promise of their release had come before dawn today in negotiations after the two had rejected the government's offer to transfer the pair to a penitentiary in Oklahoma.

The Justice Department said it had no explanation for the number of inmates released and its earlier reports that a dozen inmates were being held.

As the anticipated time of release passed with no one let out of the basement cellblock, a Justice Department spokesman said, "I don't see how they are going to arrange it that fast."

Negotiations continued on a frank and open basis, he said, but he gave no indication when the release could be completed.

A U.S. marshal's van pulled up to the back entrance about 7:45 a.m., but no move was made to load it.

Authorities still made no move to give the two men the plane ride out of the country that they had demanded since taking control of a basement cellblock about 2 p.m. Thursday.

The convicts, Frank Gorham, 25, and Robert Jones, 24, who also uses the name Otis D. Wilkerson, had never described the inmates of the detention cells as hostages.

Gorham and Jones had threatened late Friday to behead a hostage with an ax unless the government became more responsive to their demands.

They also threatened to kill the hostages if police stormed the cellblock in the basement of the courthouse where the Watergate grand jury investigation and trials have been held.

AURELIA — Pitcher Mike Gute and catcher Joe Roetker brought Kuemper out of its four-game losing streak here Friday night to lead the Knights past the state's 10th-rated Class A team, Aurelia, 7-1.

Gute turned in his best performance on the mound this season as he hurled a four-hitter and struck out 10.

Roetker had the big bat, collecting a run-scoring single in the fifth and adding a three-run homer over the right field fence in the seventh to wrap up the team's eighth win against 10 losses.

Aurelia came into the game with a 13-1 record with six straight victories, their only loss coming to Hartley.

But Gute was strong the entire evening and the Bulldogs' only run came in the sixth on an apparent balk that let Curt Nelson score.

The balk was disputed

vehemently by Kuemper coaches. Lou Galetich and Jerry Spieler for about five minutes before play resumed.

The Knights, who were routed 10-5 by Aurelia in their season opener, got a run in the first with the help of wildness by pitcher Mike Tietgen.

Russ Rupiper walked to start the inning. After Gute singled with one out, Tom Nurse was hit by a pitch to load the bases.

Tietgen got Roetker on strikes, but hit Jeff Hunter with a pitch to make it 1-0.

Snead in Contention With 65

BETTENDORF, Iowa (AP)—It was like a page out of yesteryear. There in the interview area sat Sam Snead, again challenging for a golf title.

For the second straight week, the 62-year-old legend was in a position to capture a tournament title—something he hasn't done in nine years.

"I just wanted to shoot about 65 today, and then make a run at them the next two days," said the winner of 134 tournaments (unofficial) and 84 official dating back to 1933.

And 65—six under—was what the "Virginia Hillbilly" shot Friday in the \$100,000 Quad Cities Open and combined with a first-round 69 he stood just three shots behind 36-hole leader Ed Snead.
