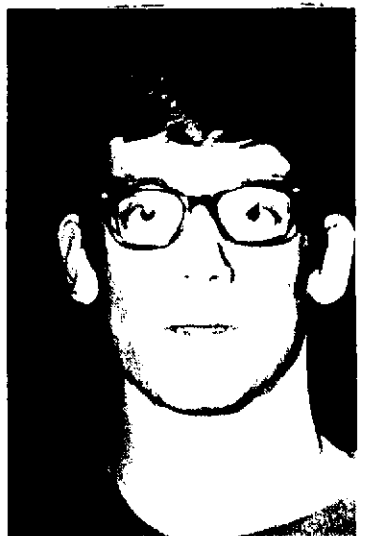

Knights Share Title

Phil Baldus came to bat in the 10th inning without a hit in five official at bats, in fact, he hadn't even reached base. But the righthanded hitter delivered an one-out single to left, scoring Larry McLellan from third base with the winning run as Kuemper nipped Perry, 5-4, in an extra inning thriller Tuesday night at Carroll Stadium.

The victory gave the Knights a share of the Midwest Eastern Division crown with Jefferson as both closed out play with identical 6-2 records.

The two teams will play for the outright title Friday night at either Carroll or Jefferson depending on how a coin flip goes.

The Knights had tied the game earlier in the inning at four-all as John Heithoff walked to lead off the frame against Bluejay reliever Rick Carstens.

McLellan then laid down a

perfect bunt. Carstens had no choice but to throw out McLellan at first. His throw was wild and Heithoff scored all the way from first with McLellan ending up on third.

After Tim Roetker struck out and Alan Oswald was hit by a pitch, Baldus lashed his winning hit.

Perry had taken a 4-3 lead in the top of the 10th as Tim Keenan reached base second on a wild throw on a ground ball to first.

After Mike Gute, in relief of starter Alan Kohorst, got Carstens and Tim Moyer out, Jeff Thorpe reached on an infield hit. Then catcher Don Lapp singled to make it 4-3.

While Gute picked up the victory in his one inning of relief pitching, hats off must go to Kohorst who was superb for Kuemper on the mound through the first nine innings.

With some luck, Kohorst could have won the game in the seventh, but the Knights let a 3-2 lead get away from them.

Kohorst tossed a three-hitter in his long appearance, his best effort of the season and added 10 strikeouts.

Through the first six innings, the big righthander had allowed only one hit, a triple by Moyer in the first.

The Bluejays, who finished the conference season at 5-3 and are now 7-9 overall, got the tying run in the seventh with the help of one big Kuemper error.

With two out and Lapp on first with a walk, Mike McMichael reached on an error as the Knights' Gute booted a routine ground ball

..... that would have ended the game.

Then Randy Ingalls, who had struck out two times earlier in the game, doubled to

right center to send the game into overtime.

After Perry took a 1-0 lead in the first on a walk to Keenan and Moyer's triple, the Knights took command the rest of the way.

Kuemper tied things at 1-1 in their first as Russ Rupiper walked and was sacrificed to second. Then Gute lined a single to score Rupiper.

The Knights made it 2-1 in the fourth as John Heithoff tripled and came home on a single to right by McLellan.

Then Kuemper got an insurance run in the fifth to make it 3-1 as Gute doubled to left center and scored two outs later on a single by Jeff Hunter.

Perry got an unearned run in the sixth and got that tying run in the seventh.

Both teams had their chances to win the game in the eighth and ninth innings but failed as Carstens and Kohorst were tough on the mound.

Kuemper captured the junior varsity game, 6-4, as

Joe Goblirsch got the victory on the mound.

Rick Friedman belted a double and a single and Marty Thelen added two singles for Kuemper. Also, Terry Hammen tripled for Jerry Spieler's JV squad.

Rams Clip Tigers, 6-2

JEFFERSON — For the second time this season Jefferson pitcher Chris Blackburn throttled the Carroll Tigers Tuesday night.

June 21 in Carroll, Blackburn won 8-0; Tuesday here he won 6-2, giving up two hits and a pair of walks while striking out 14 batters.

The same two Tigers touched Blackburn for singles Tuesday night as did June 21: Todd Buck and Ted Nam.

Buck opened the Midwest Conference game with a smash single, but was later thrown out by the catcher attempting to steal second. Blackburn fanned the next two Tiger batters to end hopes of an early Carroll lead.

The Rams tallied at least one run in every inning but the sixth as they upped their record to 10-5 on the season and 6-5 in loop play. Carroll fell to 6-8 and 3-5.

Carroll will travel to Manning Friday night. A game scheduled for today against Breda has been cancelled.

Blackburn's mound opponent, Pete Marz, "pitched a heck of a ball game," Carroll Coach Ted

Edwards said after the game. Marz struck out four Rams and gave up three earned runs and four hits.

Blackburn scored two of his team's runs after being issued walks.

In fact, four of the six Jefferson runs were scored by walked batsmen.

The Ram pitcher scored in the first on a Tiger error and crossed the plate in the third on a triple by Ron Rohovit, the game's only extra-base hit.

Aided by two Carroll errors and two singles, Jefferson tallied two runs in the fourth frame. Single runs came in the second and fifth.

Five of the first six innings Blackburn set the Tigers down in order. He walked Marz in the second to give Carroll its only base runner of the first six innings.

The visitors started a rally in the seventh, led off by a walk given Lonnie Lehrkamp. Nam then ripped an infield single, and was hurt on a later play going into second. He injured his right leg.

An error on the Ram shortstop let the first Tiger run cross and a right field error allowed the other run to

score.

The game was delayed 15 minutes during the Ram half of the fifth inning after electrical problems caused the field lights to go off.

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Ken Rosewall, the seemingly ageless 39-year-old who has been the Wimbledon runner-up three times but never a champion, and Stan Smith, the winner here in 1972, advanced to the semifinals of the All-England Tennis Championships today.

Rosewall upended top-seeded John Newcombe, a fellow Australian, 6-1, 1-6, 6-0, 7-5, and Smith conquered Ismael El Shafie, 9-8, 7-5, 6-8, 7-5, the unseeded Egyptian who had upset two seeded players in earlier rounds.

Chris Evert, the fashionable teen-ager from Fort Lauderdale, Fla., whipped Helga Masthoff, a former West German model, 6-4, 6-2, in the women's quarter-finals.
