attempted to have the case moved into federal District Court, claiming that if it lost the case entirely it would cost them \$14,894.50 — the amount the city was seeking in damages, plus the \$6,400 already withheld from the contract.

A U.S. District Court does not have jurisdiction in cases involving less than \$10,000. But the city asked the case be sent back to the state District Court since it sought damages of only \$8,494.50.

U. S. District Court Judge William C. Hanson, citing a precedent case 'Massachusetts State Pharmaceutical Association vs. Federal Prescription Service," ruled that the amount in controversy is "tested by the value of the suit's intended benefit to the plaintiff (the city).,' For this reason, he remanded the action back to state District Court.

#### **GOP Platform Calls for Nixon** to Cooperate

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP)-The 1974 Iowa Republican platform covers a gamut of issues, including a call for President Nixon to co-operate in his impeachment investigation.

The draft will be proposed at the Republican State Convention in Des Moines July 19 and 20.

It says in part: "We share the confusion and concern of many. The Republican Party of Iowa states emphatically it does not condone the action of some within the administration.

'Those who have misused public trust at all levels must be dealt with in terms that will discourage a repeat perform-

ance. 'We urge President Nixon to fulfill his promise of co-operation with the investigaton and respectfully request that the press refrain from contributing to prejudging of guilt."

Unlike the platform adopted by the state's Democrats last month, the Republican platform is a general statement of principle with few specific details.

The platform mentions such issues as congressional reform, strengthening local government, year-round use of schools and protection for

### **6 Elevators** Form a Co-op

BRITT, Iowa (AP)-Six cooperative elevators have formed a separate co-op to try to alleviate the grain car shortage by marketing their corn and soybeans together.

The new co-op is the North Central Marketing Co-operative, an organization that has storage facilities of 4.8 million bushels. It is expected the co-op will market about 15 million bushels of corn and soybeans annually.

The six elevators that have joined together are located at Britt, Kanawha, Wesley, Corwith, Forest City and Woden. Three of those have branch

elevators. Gilbert Guenther, a Britt farmer and president of the new co-op, says current plans call for local co-ops to load rail cars whenever they can and to haul corn and soybeans to "grain train" points at other times by truck.

'Our main purpose is to utilize all the facilities we have available and to work co-operatively," Guenther said.

There was a three-week period in 1973—when rail cars were scarce-when transportation tie-ups created a situation where no local grain market existed because facilities could not be emptied of corn and soybeans in the

## **River Cities to Benefit From Transport**

CLINTON, Iowa (AP)-Iowa cities along the Mississippi and Missouri rivers may derive great benefits as the state continues to unify transportation, Gov. Robert Ray said Saturday.

Ray was in Clinton to dedicate a \$22 million flood protection project consisting of eight miles of levees to protect 2,000 acres of land, homes, public facilities and industry.

"Location on this river becomes even more of an asset as ways are developed to thwart water rampages," Ray said in prepared remarks.

"We in Iowa are now

moving into a new

appreciation of a unified transportation system, one in which river traffic may play an even more important role than it has in our modern past." Ray said the future could hold "great benefit to those communities fortunate

enough to be situatied along our two great waterways. Much of our chronic shortage of boxcars at harvest time could be relieved by better use of river ports to move our feed grains.

The Clinton project was authorized by Congress in 1968 and provides levees stretching along the river from Clinton's northern limits to the city's southwest extremity.

Others who were involved in the dedication were Rep. John Culver, D Iowa; Clinton Mayor H.E. Obermiller; former Mayor Harold H. Domsalla, who instigated the project; and Col. Walter H. Johnson, Rock Island District engineer.

The Army officer also presented a new Corps of Engineers towboat, the "Clinton," which was christened by the present mayor's wife.

#### Clear Lake Short on Water

CLEAR LAKE, Iowa (AP)— Clear Lake residents have been asked to use water until July 15 because of a severe water shortage facing the city.

The city council issued the proclamation Friday after holding an emergency session. Officials say residents use over 980,000 gallons of water daily, thus making the city's

water plant hard pressed to meet demands. The plant usually produces one million gallons daily with one million gallons in tank re-

serves. Mayor Floyd Nesbit said two of the three reserves tanks are now dry, and the main tank is two-thirds full and could conceivably go dry within two days.

A water plant under construction is to begin operations by Aug. 1. It will double city's water city capacity and cut into the shortage, but Nesbit said construction may not completed by the due date.

The water plant project was begun with the intention of meeting increased summertime demand but normal consumption during this period has taken a considerable jump, officials

"We don't want to get into a first class crisis where we have to start shutting off water, "said Nesbit.

He cautioned that should a fire or some other emergency necessitate such action, the city council would take appropriate measures for cutting off the supply.

## Watercraft Law Open to Interpretation

# **Propane Gas** Line Explodes

DEWITT, Iowa (AP) - A 10-inch propane gas line exploded late Friday morning south of DeWitt sending flames roaring into the sky and threatening a nearby farm house and a parallel pipeline.

No injuries were reported and firefighters from DeWit, Long Grove and McCausland reportedly had the fire under control.

The pipeline is located one mile north of the Wapsiipinican River east of U.S. Highway 61 in Clinton County. Recent heavy rains had ex-

posed the pipeline on a field of soybeans owned by Jerry Green of rural DeWitt. "We heard a sound just like a bomb." Green said. "It spread out all over pretty fast

and my first thought was to get the heck out of here." Firefighters were guarding Green's house, located nearly 300 vards from the pipeline. Green said the pipeline is owned by the Mid America Pipeline Čorp, Tulsa, Okla,

An employe at the scene

theorized the explosion may have been caused by a spark from a nearby power line-igniting the leaking gas. Green said workmen were

able to shut off gas to both pipelines shortly after the exolosion. Orange and black smoke could be seen for several miles and some residents in Davenport reported they were able

to see the blaze from their homes. Mrs. Rudy Litcher, owner of Fairyland Park, Long Grove, which is located about one half mile from the explosion site said, "We didn't see it right

away, then it started." One of the doctors camping near here saw it and said it sounded like a big blow torch. The flames were way up in the sky about 100 or so feet. At first we thought it was a building but then the smoke got real black so we figured it was oil," she said.

Clinton and Scott County sheriff's deputies along with the Iowa Highway Patrol said motorists along the road observing the fire caused a traffic jam as they stopped for a view of the fiery cone.

Friday. The firm Farmland Enterprises, Inc., also of Omaha, was suspended from doing business for 30 days beginning July 9. West is president of Farmland and was described as "a major livestock buyer" at Omaha's Union Stockyards.

West also was told to sell his interests in four other firms: Nebraska Order Buyers Inc., Omaha; F. R. West & Co., Wichita, Kan.; Iowa Order Buyers, Sioux City, Iowa, and Denver Order Buyers, Inc., Denver.

The department's Packers

and Stockyards Administration said West will be allowed to retain ownership and management interests in American Beef, which officials said was the second largest beef-slaughtering


