

Tigers End Frustration With Bluejays, 8-7

Carroll ended years of frustration against Perry here Monday night, scoring a come-from-behind 8-7 victory over the Bluejays.

It was the Tigers' first triumph over Perry in eight tries, spanning five years and more importantly, it kept Ted Edwards' club in a tie with Jefferson for the Midwest Conference Eastern Division lead at 2-0. Kuemper is next at 2-1.

"We hung in there," noted Edwards after the game. "Being behind doesn't seem to bother our kids."

But Edwards had a warning for his young, talented club. "We have to learn to play seven innings because we won't be lucky all the time."

The Bluejays made it 7-1 in the fourth as Scott Seeley singled home the singling Don Lapp. That run was made possible as Al Lenz reached base on an error.

The Tigers came up with their winning runs in the sixth as they got their rally going after the first two batters went out.

Lonny Lehrkamp laid down

a perfect bunt single. The throw to first to retire him was wild and Lehrkamp moved all the way to third.

The next batter, Siemer, reached on an error to score Lehrkamp to tie the game at 7-all and after Todd Pettitt walked, Brad Edwards blooped a single to left to drive in Siemer with the winning run.

Carroll got back into the game in the fourth as they sent

10 men to the plate. They got five runs on only one hit — Jim Petersen's second hit of the game. But three walks and three Perry errors were big keys in the uprising.

Tiger Jots: Petersen was the Tigers' hitting star, going two-for-three with a big two-run single in the fourth.

Carroll is off to his best start in years. They're 5-1 overall.

Pettitt will be the Carroll starting pitcher when they entertain Sac City at 8 p.m. Wednesday night.

On Friday night, Carroll will host Lake City and then on Saturday, they will play Jefferson at Jefferson in a make-up game.

Pirates Stay Hot; Rout Cardinals

If there's anything a pitcher likes more than a humming fastball or a sharp-breaking curve ball, it's a soaring home run ball.

Bruce Kison of the Pittsburgh Pirates had plenty of them Monday night.

Not that he was giving up the homers, mind you. He was in the dugout, gleefully watching them bounce off the bats of teammates Willie Stargell, Rennie Stennett and Al Oliver, bombs that highlighted a 15-hit assault which powered the Pirates to a 10-4 rout of the St. Louis Cardinals.

In the rest of the National League, Chicago outlasted Philadelphia 9-7, San Diego upended San Francisco 7-1, Cincinnati beat Atlanta 9-2 and Los Angeles defeated Houston 4-2. New York and Montreal were not scheduled.

"All our hitters seem to be coming to life at once. It's great for a pitcher," Kison said after the Pirates chalked up their fifth straight victory and their 16th in the last 21 games to open a two-game edge over the idle Mets in the East Division.

Stennett led the Pittsburgh stampede against loser Ron Bryant and four relievers — one of them Bob Gibson — with four runs batted in on his homer and two singles.

Cubs 9, Phillies 7
Like the Pirates, the Cubs

flexed some pretty solid muscles to beat Philadelphia. Andy Thornton, Manny Trillo, Jerry Morales and Tim Hosley slugged home runs that helped bring Chicago back from a 5-1 deficit after 5½ innings.

Bill Madlock, the league's batting leader with a .367 average, doubled in the fourth and scored Chicago's first run. With two out in the seventh, he beat out a bunt that gave Morales a chance to tie the game with a homer — which he did. And he capped a four-run rally in the eighth with a two-run single that provided the final margin of victory.

Padres 7, Giants 1
San Diego managed only two singles through the first five innings against the Giants. Then, as Padres Coach Jim Davenport put it,

"We got some funny hits."

What they got was six of them in the sixth inning, good for six runs. Pitcher Rich Folkers got one of them. He

bounced the ball off the artificial turf and over the head of reliever Gary Lavelle — and two runs scored while the Giants waited for the ball to come down.

Reds 9, Braves 2
Joe Morgan paced Cincinnati's attack against the Braves by driving in four runs with a single, double and home run to help Don Gullett post his fifth straight victory.

Gullett raised his record to 9-3. He's off to his best start since breaking into the majors five years ago at the age of 19. The triumph kept the Reds 3½ games ahead of second-place Los Angeles in the West.

Dodgers 4, Astros 2
Willie Crawford hit a solo homer in the second inning, then Steve Garvey hit a two-run shot in the seventh to give the Dodgers their victory over Houston and make Don Sutton the league's first 11-game winner. Cesar Cedeno hit a two-run homer for the Astros.

All-Stater Onken Signs With Boone

Carroll High School all-state basketball player Dean Onken signed the Iowa area community college athletic association letter of intent Monday to attend Des Moines Area Community College Boone Campus.

The 6-foot, five inch center, who was named to the Iowa Daily Press Association second team all-state squad, was contacted by 50 colleges.

He narrowed his choice to the Boone and Grand View (Des Moines) Junior College campuses.

"We were very pleased to get Dean," Boone head basketball coach Jerry Nauman said Monday. "I've watched Dean play several times over the past year and I felt he was definitely one of the best players in the state."

Nauman continued, "He has the ability to be a tremendous player. He's what we needed to make our program as strong as others in the state."

The Boone coach also said that Dean was the best player in this area and feels he'll help in getting other top area

basketball players. Onken's reasons for choosing the Boone school were that it was close to home so that his parents and friends could see him play and the education he would receive for two years.

Onken averaged 24 points and 13 rebounds for the Tigers this past year. He hit on 57 per cent of his field goal tries and connected on 74 per cent of his free throw tosses.

Onken's biggest night this winter came against Jefferson when he set a new school and Midwest Conference record by pouring in 51 points.

According to Nauman, his club had a 13-14 record last winter and with the addition of Onken to go along with four starters, Nauman said things are bright for the coming year.

Returning starters for the Boone club are Eugene Lewis and Greg Alvoid of Omaha and Ron Anderson and Tom Duffy of Boone.

Nauman also said that he has signed Dennis Houck, a 6-foot, five inch player from O'Gorman High School in Sioux Falls, S.D. Houck is a transfer from the University of South Dakota at Vermillion.
