Carroll Runs Mark to 10-0

Carroll downed Sac City here Wednesday night 10-7, but not before allowing the Indians to capitalize errors.

The win extended the high riding Tigers' streak to 7-0 in Midwest Conference play and 10-0 overall.

The game was by no means a thing of beauty to watch. Carroll led 8-0 when Sac City came to bat in the top of the fifth. Then, things fell apart.

First, the Indians loaded the

bases on two walks and an error. Then opposing pitcher Terry Intveld knocked a clean double off Eric Siemer and chalked up three RBIs.

Sac City scored twice more in the inning — on a wild pitch and on an error. The score was a much closer 8-5 when Carroll got the batter's box back.

But Carroll players had their high points too. Eric Siemer hit a run-scoring triple in the first and Jerry Hamers contributed three RBIs on a

single and a fielder's choice. Jim Petersen also got two RBIs from a single and a double.

Pinch-hitting probably saved the day for Sac City with six making appearances at bat. However, hitting was not the Indian's strong point as Siemer gave up only three hits the entire game.

Intveld's double was Sac City's only extra base hit.

Carroll will travel to Audubon for a return game

Friday night and will play host in the Carroll Invitational Saturday and Sunday.

Carroll's opponent at 8:30 p.m. Saturday is Scranton.

Irwin Plays Well on Tough Courses

DULUTH, Ga. (AP) — Hale Irwin has a history of playing well on tough golf courses, although he's not sure why.

"I don't know if I play harder because the course is tougher or if the field just doesn't play as well as it

normally does." Irwin said Wednesday on the eve of the 76th U.S. Open Golf Championship.

"But I like to respond to that challenge on a tough course. I think it's a day-to-day thing, though. The trick is to eliminate the bad errors."

Anthony's, Heires Share Top

Anthony's and Heires Electric share first-place in the Women's Golf League at the Carroll Country Club. Both have 25 points.

In play Wednesday, Anthony's downed Feld Equipment, 8-2; Heires beat Whaley Chevrolet, 7-3; Community Jewelry whipped Schenkelberg Implement, 7-3; First Federal beat Wittrock Motors, 6-4; and Juergens Travel downed L.A. Smith Company, 6-4.

The former University of Colorado football star has recorded most of his seven tour victories on courses considered difficult.

Twice he has captured the Heritage at Hilton Head. He won the 1974 U.S. Open at Winged Foot. He won twice last year on tough layouts — the Western Open at Butler National and the Atlanta Classic on the rolling hills of Atlanta Country Club. Irwin won at Los Angeles this year on the tough Riviera course.

Low gross honors went to Donna Snyder with a 44 and low net to Elaine Till with a 30. Anthony's was low team with a 140.

In a pro shop event, Snyder's 44 was good for low gross in the low division, while low net went to Cindy Hayes with a 38. Gross honors in the high division went to Jean Schenkelberg with a 50 and high net to Elaine Smith with a 41.

The soft-spoken Missouri native faces another challenging course today, ranking among the favorites to win the first National Open ever held in the South.

This one is at the Atlanta Athletic Club, a 7,015-yard layout that plays to par 70.

"The U.S. Open course is always in the tough course category," Irwin said, "and this one is no exception."

Many of the 150 players entered have tabbed Jack Nicklaus, Tom Weiskopf and Irwin as the players to beat.

"You could throw in a whole bunch of other people," Irwin said. "Why not Johnny Miller? What about Ray Floyd? It's a good course for him. There are others, too."

"There's just no way to fairly predict anybody to win," he said. "This isn't like football. There you've got two teams and one has to win. There's just too many out here who can win."

Bill Travers pitched a three-hitter for his eighth victory of the season and Gorman Thomas drove in three runs with a homer and sacrifice fly as Milwaukee beat California. Travers, hurling his third shutout of the season and lowering his ERA to 1.59, improved his record to 8-3 in winning for the sixth time in his last seven decisions.

Yankees 9, Twins 4
Roy White had two doubles and a single and scored three times, and Oscar Gamble hit a three-run homer to spark New York over Minnesota. White doubled and scored in the first inning, drove in a second-inning run with a sacrifice fly, scored in the fifth after a single and doubled and came home again in the seventh. Gamble slammed his sixth home run of the year off Twins' reliever Tom Burgmeier, giving the Yanks a 9-4 lead and insuring the victory for Ed Figueroa, 7-4.

"He's got better stuff than 99 per cent of the pitchers in the American League," says Cleveland pitcher Jackie Brown. "but I don't know what's wrong with him. He'll throw two good pitches, then he'll throw one right across the middle."

The Texas right-hander continued to be as erratic as his curve ball Wednesday night, losing a 9-4 decision to the Indians. That lowered his record to 4-8 and was his third straight loss since his acquisition from Minnesota on June 1.

After a walk to Willie Crawford and a one-out error by first baseman Willie Montanez, pinch hitter Vic Harris singled the lying run home off reliever Mike Beard. Phil Niekro retired Jerry Mumphrey on a fly ball before walking Don Kessinger to load the bases. McBride's game-winning hit followed.

Elsewhere in the National League, the Pittsburgh Pirates remained seven games behind Philadelphia in the East Division with a 6-3 triumph over the Houston Astros; the Chicago Cubs stopped the Cincinnati Reds 5-3 in a 6 1/2-inning rain-shortened game; the Los Angeles Dodgers downed the New York Mets 4-1; the San Diego Padres trimmed the Montreal Expos 6-2 and the St. Louis Cardinals edged the

Kuhn Calls for Baseball Hearing Today
NEW YORK (AP) — Marvin Miller once asked of the baseball owners' individual and sometimes conflicting ways: "Who's going to protect the owners from themselves?"

It may be Commissioner Bowie Kuhn.

Kuhn, wondering if there might be something rotten in his kingdom, called for a hearing in New York today to discuss Charles O. Finley's sale

of three of his top players from the Oakland A's, a sale that brought shrill cries of agony from fans and other club owners alike.

But Kuhn did more than just call together the principles involved. He halted the sale of pitcher Vida Blue to the New York Yankees for a reported \$1.5 million and the sale of pitcher Rollie Fingers and outfielder Joe Rudi to the Boston Red Sox for \$1 million apiece, and kept them on the Oakland roster.

Like it or not, Finley still owns the trio — at the moment. And, by order of the commissioner, he can't use them.

Allen's Bat Keys Red Hot Phillies
