## Carroll Remains Unbeaten in Loop

AUDUBON — Carroll trailed Audubon for three innings Friday night, but came back to win big, 12-3, here.

Audubon hitters were able to score from starting pitcher Tom Reiman in the first and third innings. The first run came when Randy Smith singled and brought in Neal Campbell.

The second, a third-inning run by Dirk Christiansen, was hotly contested by the Carroll bench. Christiansen, on third base following a double and an advance, ran in to score after Randy Smith dropped the bat on the ball following what looked like a strikeout.

The umpire declared that although Smith was indeed out, Christiansen's run scored.

Audubon got on the board for the last time in the seventh when Scott Petersen scored on Don Mountain's double.

The Tigers were trailing the Wheelers 2-0 when Brad Edwards stepped to bat in the top of the third. He led off with a single followed by a double

by Eric Siemer.

Both Edwards and Siemer were unable to score, however. Edwards was put out in a slide attempt at home plate and Siemer was caught in a home-third base hot box.

But Gary Luchtel was responsible for two RBIs on an error and Todd Pettitt brought in one RBI with a double.

Audubon's pitcher Campbell couldn't make his fast ball zing in the sixth when Carroll scored six runs on four hits.

Campbell pitched six innings giving up 13 hits and striking out four. He was relieved by Jerry Wellendorf who gave up two hits, two walks and struck out one in the seventh.

Tom Reiman pitched three innings for Carroll giving up four hits, three walks and striking out four. Teammate Todd Pettitt pitched the last four innings giving up two hits, walking none and striking out four.

"We have to keep winning because nobody's going to take Denison," said Coach Ted Edwards referring to the Midwest Conference rival which has only lost to the Tigers.

# Carroll's 12-Game Streak Ends

The bubble burst on Carroll Sunday afternoon in their own invitational as Denison ended the Tigers' 12-game winning streak, 9-2.

All-state basketball guard Pat Sullivan showed his versatility on the diamond as he singled twice and doubled once to drive in four runs.

Denison jumped out to a 2-0 lead in the first as leadoff batter Greg Steele tripled to center.

After Tiger starting pitcher Jerry Hamers got Pat Millea on a ground out, Sullivan ripped a single to left to score Steele.

The Monarchs got their second run as Doug Wiebers' fly ball to left was lost in the sun for a single, allowing Sullivan to come home.

Sullivan singled home Millea who had walked and

stole second.

After Wiebers reached base on an error, Scott Jones laid down a perfect bunt to score Sullivan for the second run.

The Tigers got their first run in the third as Todd Buck singled and Jim Petersen doubled off the fence in left. Brad Edwards then singled in a run, but that was it as the Monarchs' Terry Denker struck out Eric Siemer and Hamers to end the inning.

The Monarchs increased their margin to 6-1 in the fourth as two Carroll errors proved costly. Key hits in the frame were a double by Mike Mendlik and a single by designated hitter Jeff Christiansen.

Carroll got their final run in the fifth as Edwards delivered a triple to right to score Jim Petersen.

## Tigers Overcome Big Trojan Lead

Carroll overcame a 7-0 deficit and held on for a 9-8 triumph over previously-unbeaten Scranton in first round Carroll Invitational play Saturday night.

The victory was the Tigers' 12th straight, while Scranton, leaders of the Coon Valley Conference, fell for the first time in nine games.

The Tigers used two innings to do all their scoring, getting six runs in the bottom of the second to close within 7-6 and scoring three times in the fifth to take a 9-7 lead.

Todd Pettitt put on a stellar performance in relief for Ted Edwards' club to pick up his fifth win.

Pettitt relieved starter Brad Edwards in the third and gave up just one hit over the last five frames, while striking out seven.

Things got a little scary in the seventh for Carroll as the Trojans' Randy Walker reached first on an error, stole second and went to third on a ground out.

Moments later Walker scored on Pat Lyons' ground out to make it 9-8. With two out, designated hitter Jeff Neary hit a slow roller to the right side of the mound. Pettitt's throw to first was wild and Neary raced all the way to third.

But Pettitt settled down and fanned Kent Juergens to end the contest.

Scranton's seven-run burst in the second was highlighted by Walker's grand slam homer over the 326-foot sign in left. It marked the third home run in four games in the tournament.

The Tigers, who banged out eight hits, seven off of southpaw starter Kent Citurs, got their bats going in the last of the second.
