

Carroll Takes Loop Lead

It took three hours and 10 innings, but the Carroll Tigers took the Midwest Conference lead, beating Denison, 5-4, here Monday night.
The win boosted Carroll to 3-0 in the conference and 5-0 overall. The record is the best start in Coach Ted Edwards' six years at Carroll.

Monday's game was a pitcher's game. Eric Siemer went the first eight innings, giving up three hits, six walks and striking out eight. He was relieved by Todd Pettitt in the ninth who held the Monarchs to no hits and struck out two. Denison's Terry Denker

gave up six hits, walked eight and struck out 12 before being relieved by Doug Wiebers in the ninth. Wiebers finished the game allowing no hits and walking two.
The evening's biggest hits came from Carroll's Siemer whose fifth inning single brought in Todd Buck, and

Jim Petersen's non-scoring double in the fifth.
Denison's biggest hit came from Pat Sullivan who tripled in the seventh. He came home on a passed ball.
Errors played a big part in the game with the Tigers committing four and Denison responsible for five.

Denison got on the board early with two runs coming in the first. The first run was scored on Wiebers' sacrifice and the second on a Carroll error.
Denison's Greg Steele brought in the third run on a single in the second inning.
Carroll did not score until Jerry Hamers' third inning single brought in Petersen.
The Tigers tied the game at 3-3 in the fifth inning with Siemer's bases-loaded single bringing in Buck and Jim Molitor's walk bringing in Brad Edwards.

Denison broke the tie when Pat Sullivan scored on a passed ball in the seventh.
A balk on Denison's Todd Denker allowed Carroll's Gary Luchtel to score the tying run at 4-4 in the seventh.
Carroll's Mark Steffes finally broke the deadlock by scoring on a passed ball in the

tenth.
Tigers' mentor Ted Edwards was not pleased with the play, however.
"This game wasn't played like a championship game," he said. "We're still having trouble getting men on base and committing errors."
The game put Denison at 3-2 overall. The Monarchs' other loss was at the hands of a strong Storm Lake club.

Texas' Umbarger Wins Sixth Game

BALTIMORE (AP) — When Frank Lucchesi replaced Billy Martin as manager of the stumbling Texas Rangers last July 21, he was able to experiment while evaluating the club for the remainder of the season.

appearances were starts and he won the last four to finish at 8-7. This year, Umbarger has been strictly a starter, and he is 6-4 after beating the Baltimore Orioles 6-4 Monday night with ninth-inning relief help from Steve Foucault.

Olympics Had Great Effect on NBA Draft

NEW YORK (AP) — Today's National Basketball Association draft had a great effect on last week's United States Olympic basketball trials.

Robert Parish of Centenary and Leon Douglas of Alabama, both certain first-round choices in the NBA draft, pulled out of the trials because they feared damaging their chances at pro contracts. They felt an injury or bad showing during the trials or Games could have been devastating.

But two other sure first-round picks, All Americans Scott May of Indiana and Adrian Dantley of Notre Dame, tried out and made the Olympic team with no concern about the draft.

"I'm not here to impress the pros," said May, college basketball's player of the year. "My value won't change. What does the Olympics decide compared to what I've done for the last four years?"

Dantley, who did not withdraw his name from the hardship draft list, agreed.

"I know a lot of guys dropped out because they didn't want to get hurt," he said. "But you don't play the same here as you do during

the season. There's much more of a team concept."
Others expected to go early in the draft but missing from the Olympic trials were UCLA team mates Richard Washington and Marques Johnson, both hardship cases, and guard John Lucas of Maryland.

The hardship players had until 5 p.m. EDT Monday to withdraw their names from draft consideration. Among those who pulled back and decided to remain in college were Bo Ellis of Marquette, Bernard King of Tennessee, Tree Rollins of Clemson, and Rickey Green of Michigan.

Houston owned the first choice in today's draft, acquiring it from Atlanta Monday along with center Dwight Jones in exchange for center Joe Meriweather, guard Gus Bailey and the Rockets' first-round pick.

Until that deal was made, Atlanta had been expected to go for Parish to solve the team's problem at center. But the switch of draft slots with the Rockets left the Hawks with the ninth choice in the opening round and it was unlikely that Parish, a can't-miss prospect, would last that long.


