Monarchs Move into Second, 3-0

JEFFERSON — Carroll came back in dramatic fashion after trailing 3-0 going into the sixth inning to score a run in the sixth, two in the seventh to tie and scored twice more in the eighth inning for a 5-3 win over Jefferson here Wednesday.

First baseman Eric Siemer woke up the quiet Tiger bats to start off the seventh inning when he clubbed a solo homer over the center field fence to make the score 3-2. Tom Reiman scored Carroll's first run on an error by the Ram shortstop after he was walked, advanced to second on another

walk and took third on Jim Molitor's sacrifice bunt.

Brad Edwards singled after Siemer's homer and scored the tying run on another error by the Jefferson shortstop. The Tigers were retired in the seventh inning with the bases loaded for the third time in the game.

Dan Wittrock singled in Todd Buck, who walked, for the winning run with only one out in the eighth inning. Reiman then gave his club some insurance as he belted a single, sending Edwards across the plate for the two-run advantage.

The Rams threatened in the

seventh and eighth innings by stranding two men on base in both frames, but they lacked the hitting to bring them in. Cuddy, the starting Ram pitcher, surrendered the mound in the sixth inning, after he walked Reiman and Steffes, to Hastings, who gave up four runs and allowed five hits.

This game marks the Tigers' 19th straight conference win over the past two seasons. For this season, Carroll is leading the Midwest Conference at 5-0 and is 6-2 overall.

Winning pitcher Todd Pettitt went the distance to

notch his fourth victory against no losses. He settled down after the first inning when the Rams collected two hits and three runs off of him to scatter four hits, allowing no more runs in the last seven innings and fanned nine.

Carroll batters pounded the two Jefferson pitchers for eight hits, loaded the bases in the third, sixth and seventh innings and left two men on base in the second and eighth innings. A total of 14 Tigers were left stranded on base.

Leading the Tiger hitting were Edwards and Wittrock, who went two for four, and Siemer, who ended up two for five at the plate. Siemer's home run was the only Carroll extra base hit.

"Our second, third, and fourth batters (Siemer, Edwards and Wittrock) rapped the ball well for us tonight," said Tiger Coach Ted Edwards, who had thought in the sixth inning that

his team was headed for defeat.

"The last two games we played were too easy for us and we weren't ready to play this one," he explained. In their last two previous outings, the Tigers trounced Lake City 15-0 in five innings and ran over Manning, 18-1, in three.

Carroll will host Sac City Friday. Over the weekend starting Saturday, the Tigers will play in their own invitational tournament in which Kumper, St. Bernard of Breda and powerful St. Edmond of Fort Dodge will also appear.



Carew Uses Legs to Spur Twins Past Angels, 3-2

Say, who was that blur on the basepaths? That was no blur—that was Rod Carew.

Revered more as a hitter than a speedster, the veteran used both his legs and his head Wednesday night in leading the Minnesota Twins to a 3-2 victory over the California Angels.

Carew turned an ordinary double into a triple with a daring burst in the seventh inning, and that bit of highway robbery with one out eventually led to Craig Kusick's game-winning sacrifice fly.

"I don't think I would have

tried to get three out of it if there had been two outs or another pitcher besides Frank Tanana," said Carew. "You don't score too many runs off him."

In other American League games, the Seattle Mariners edged the Oakland A's 6-5 in 11 innings, the Texas Rangers blanked the Cleveland Indians 6-0, the Milwaukee Brewers beat the Baltimore Orioles 6-2 and the Detroit Tigers trounced the Toronto Blue Jays 9-0.

Carew's triple was his 11th of the season. He also singled and boosted his major-league leading batting average to .388.

Dave Goltz blanked the Angels after giving up two runs in the first inning. The burly right-hander scattered nine hits, struck out eight and walked two while going the distance for the fourth time this season.

Tanana, 10-3, fanned just three, walked four and hit one batter. Jerry Remy tripled, doubled, and singled twice for the Angels, who fell 4½ games behind the frontrunning Twins in the American League West.

Marshall allowed three hits before tiring in his third start of the year. Devine pitched the eighth and Knowles the ninth for Texas, which swept the three-game series.

Brewers 6, Orioles 2
Don Money capped Milwaukee's six-run second inning with a two-run homer, and the Brewers went on to defeat Baltimore behind the combined seven-hit pitching of Jim Slaton and Sam Hinds.

Money had two singles in addition to his homer, giving him 12 hits in his last eight games.

Cecil Cooper had two hits as Milwaukee sent 11 batters to the plate in the second. After Cooper launched the rally with a single, Mike Flanagan walked the next two batters.

Tigers 9, Blue Jays 0
Fernando Arroyo fired a five-hitter for his first major league shutout as Detroit beat Toronto. Arroyo kept Toronto batters blasting the ball into the dirt most of the game, and Tigers first baseman Jason Thompson made 16 of the Tigers' 27 putouts.

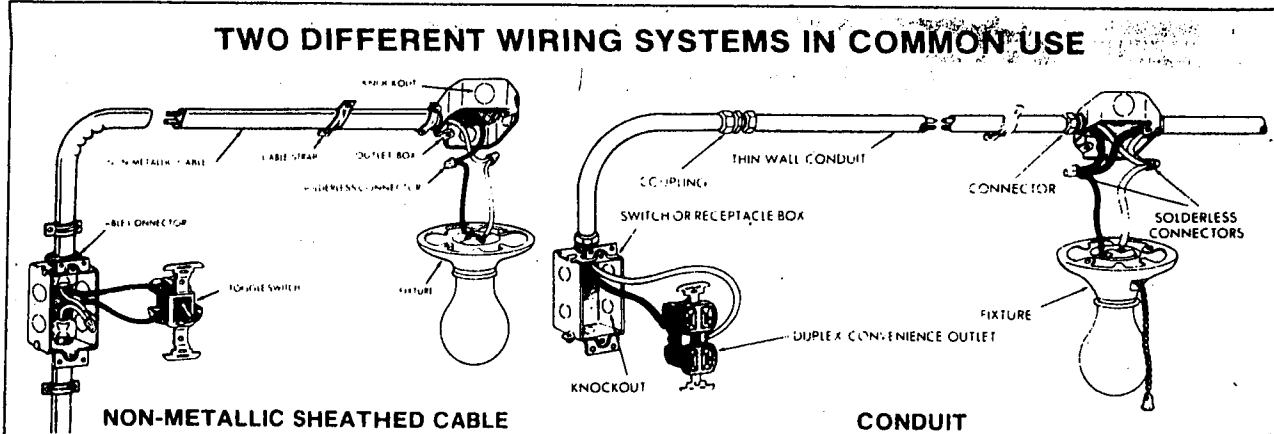
