

10 Inning Game to Tigers

Carroll's Todd Pettitt won his own game against Denison Wednesday night when he stroked a single between shortstop and third base with two outs, scoring Dan Wittrock from second for a 1-0, 10-inning victory.

Although Pettitt got the win, he pitched the last inning. Tom Reiman duelled the Monarchs' Terry Denker for nine innings, fanning 13, giving up just two hits and allowing no runs.

Denker struck out 18 batters, gave up three hits and kept the Tigers scoreless until he also was pulled from the game on the nine innings per

game pitching rule. The 3-1 Tigers have now won their last three games and are tied with Lake City for the Midwest Conference lead at 2-0. Carroll has won 16 straight conference games spanning this and last season.

Starting off Carroll's successful 10th inning was Wittrock who reached first base on an error by the first baseman. The Tiger catcher then advanced to second when Mark Steffes was walked by Namanny, the new Monarch pitcher, and scored the unearned run when Pettitt rapped his single off the third Denison pitcher, Pat Millea. Both teams mounted

scoring threats in the ninth inning. Carroll filled the bases with two walks and an error, but couldn't push a run across. Denker got on first through an error, stole second, advanced to third on Sullivan's sacrifice bunt, but was tagged out between third and home by a charging Wittrock.

The Tigers left 14 men on base, compared to Denison's seven left on base. Carroll was in scoring position earlier in the game besides the ninth when they had two men on base in the second, sixth, seventh and eighth innings.

The only extra base hit in the game was by Wittrock who slugged a double off of Denker

to start the second inning. Other Tigers smacking singles were Todd Buck in the first and Jim Molitor also in the second inning.

"Reiman pitched a hell of a game," exclaimed a happy and relieved Tiger Coach Ted Edwards. "This is as good a baseball game as you're going to see," he added.

Carroll will face city rival Kuemper Thursday at Carroll Stadium with Eric Siemer slated as the Tiger pitcher. The Knights topped the Tigers 8-3 last week.

Edwards noted that his team will "give Kuemper a good battle" and also said that he is looking forward to

Friday's Lake City game.

Arizona State, Minnesota Favored

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Top-ranked Arizona State and Minnesota should be tabbed as the co-favorites when the 31st annual College World Series opens Friday night with a doubleheader.

But upstart California State-Los Angeles likely will be the fans' choice in the eight-team, double-elimination tournament to decide the champion of major college baseball.

"This is the loosest club in the world," said rookie Cal State Coach Jack Deutsch, 59. "Pressure? They don't know what that means. Until the game starts I feel sometimes like I'm in charge of a bunch of comedians."

West Coast power Southern Cal is not laughing.

The Diablos, dubbed the "East L.A. Raggamuffins" in regional play, lost their opening qualifying game but took four straight, including coming from behind twice in late innings to eliminate

favor USC.

Arizona State, No. 1-rated in the final poll of the season by College Baseball Newspaper,

and Big Ten Conference titlist Minnesota are seeking a fourth championship.

A power almost every year since it started its program in 1959, Arizona State has qualified for the series five times in the last seven years but has met with disappointment.

On three of those trips the Sun Devils were rated No. 1. Twice Southern Cal beat them in title games, and in the last two years ASU was a disappointing third.

Veteran Coach Dick Siebert has Minnesota back for a fifth time. The Gophers were third in 1973 in their last trip.

Led by first-round draft choice Paul Molitor, Minnesota — like Arizona State, Southern Illinois and Temple — gained the series by sweeping its regional. The Gophers have won 19 of their last 20 games.

Molitor was the third player taken in the free agent draft last Tuesday. A .326 hitter, the junior shortstop is rated an outstanding fielder with

excellent speed. He was selected by Milwaukee.

Arizona State has won 18 straight and as a team is batting .340. Rick Peters (.389), Chris Bando (.385), Bob Horner (.383) and Mike Henderson (.376) power the attack. Bando is the younger brother of Milwaukee Brewer third baseman Sal Bando.

Southern Illinois and Temple also rate some support.

Valley champion Southern Illinois is the survivor of a tough regional that included perennial series qualifier Oklahoma and Michigan.

The Salukis are led by George Vukovich, a .377 hitter, and Craig Robinson, a .344 hitter with 45 runs batted in.

Temple led the nation in hitting with a .360 mark and owns 17 straight victories. Three regulars are hitting over .380, led by Pete Dempsey with a .414 mark plus 10 home runs and 55 RBIs.
