Audubon holds off Tiger rally

Everything was wild Monday night at Carroll Stadium as Audubon held off a late Carroll rally to gain an 8-6 Midwest Conference victory.

Looking at the game itself, there were 15 errors committed, nine by the Wheelers who snapped a four-game losing streak in running their loop mark to 3-4 and overall record 4-6.

Audubon, out-hit seven to four by the Tigers, built up an early lead, 7-0, in the first four and 1/2 innings and outside of Carroll rallies in the fifth and seventh innings, the weather won the headlines.

Spectacular lightning and thunder drew the biggest cheers until Carroll rallied.

"When do you make a

decision to call a game," home plate umpire Lou Galetich said Monday night after the contest. "If it's raining, there is no question."

"Was it severe enough," continued Galetich. "I didn't know. It was the first time I'd had ever worked a game under the conditions taking place. It's strictly an umpire's judgement."

Audubon used three walks, an error and a wild pitch to take a 2-0 lead in the first.

They made it 5-0 in the second on three singles, a hits batsman and an error.

The Tigers' Brad Edwards did a creditable job on the mound after taking over for Jim Molitor in the first.

Edwards, who didn't suffer the defeat, pitched the final six plus innings, allowing just

four hits and only one earned run, but the damage was done.

Two errors, three sacrifice bunts and a squeeze bunt by Tony Shima gave the visitors a 7-0 lead in the fifth.

Carroll, now 3-3 in league play and 3-6 overall, then made their comeback attempt.

Jason Sanford scored the Tigers first run in the fifth as he reached on an error and came home on a wild pitch.

Edwards reached on a dropped third strike by the catcher to score Roger Bock to make it 7-2 and the final run came in on a single by Duane Onken.

Audubon picked up an insurance tally in the sixth as Paul Campbell scored on an error.

In the seventh with the

lightning hanging over the stadium, the Tigers came up with three runs.

Edwards slammed a double to right center with one out and stole third and scored on a pass ball.

After Onken filed out to center, Molitor walked, stole second and alertly raced home on Steve O'Connor's infield hit. Dan Volk singled home the final run to make it 8-6.

Winning pitcher Tracy Hanson went the distance, scattering seven hits and fanning nine. He allowed just two earned runs.

The Tigers travel to Perry Wednesday night for an 8 p.m. game. A junior varsity contest will precede.

The Tiger JV lost to Audubon in the prelim, 11-7.

Roger Bock collected a triple and double for Carroll and teammate Scott Steffen added a two-run double.

The young Tigers are now 0-4.

Women's golf has superstar Lopez

HERSHEY, Pa. (AP) — Nancy Lopez, the hottest item in professional golf in the last 33 years, is trailing sparks with her meteoric success this year.

The entire Ladies Professional Golf Association is benefitting from the 21-year-old record shattering rookie, already the richest rookie player — male or female — to use a set of golf clubs.

Lopez, fresh off her fifth triumph in a row, a two-stroke victory over Jane Blalock and Debbie Massey at Rochester's Locust Hill Country Club, leads the field for this week's LPGA event.

"It's given us a superstar, a real celebrity," said Betsy Rawls, a Hall of Famer and now the LPGA tournament di-

rector who is setting up this week's Lady Keystone Open.

"The women's tour had been growing by leaps and bounds without her. But she's really given us a boost. People come out just to see her. She's got a quality that attracts people. They like to watch her play," said Rawls, winner of 54 tournaments in her 25 years as a touring pro.

With Arnold Palmer-like flair, Lopez has won five straight tournaments, more than any other woman in the 28-year history of the LPGA. Only Byron Nelson, who won 11 straight events in 1945 on the men's tour, has won more in succession.

Lopez, who's been at par or better in 16 of her last 17 rounds, has won a total of seven tournaments and earned \$153,336 since turning pro.

DENVER (AP) — There is no need to legislate against violence in sports, against former Heisman Trophy winner and all-pro footballer Doak Walker.

"Leave it to the players," adds Walker. "They will police themselves. From my experience, I found that the guys who persisted on trying to get in some dirty tricks never lasted very long."

Walker was a triple threat backfield star at Southern Methodist University in 1945, 1947-49, taking a year out to serve in Uncle Sam's Army, and he won college football's highest award, the Heisman Trophy, in his senior year.

From SMU, he went into the pro game with the Detroit Lions, playing six years, making all-pro and sharing in three divisional and two National Football League championships.

"At Detroit, we had what we called the 'dead dog play,'" the Doaker explained. "If one of our guys got unnecessarily roughed up, we would go back in the huddle and say, 'Dead dog 36.' The ball would go one way, the other 10 would go after number 36. Number 36 wouldn't give us much trouble after that."

Since retiring from pro football at age 28, Walker has been treated very well by life. He is a success in the construction business in Denver, married to former Olympic skier Skeeter Werner and active on both the ski slopes and the golf courses.

A member of the Cherry Hills Country Club, he served as a volunteer locker room attendant for the U.S. Open Golf Championship, won dramatically here Sunday by young Andy North.

Walker, a trim, athletic 190 pounds but beginning to gray around the temples, spent as much time talking football as golf with the battery of sports writers who descended on this mile-high city last weekend.

"Personally, I never cared much for violence," the former all-around star said. "I remember when I played in Texas high school championship game for Dallas' Highland Park against

Port Arthur, there was a kid on that team that gave me a terrible working over.

"After the game, my mouth looked as if the dentist had taken a drill and cleaned it out. I honestly don't know how I kept any teeth in my mouth at all."

Still an avid fan in this hotbed of the Super Bowl runners-up Broncos, Walker said he believed modern football players were a richer but not a happier breed.

"I don't think ball players have as much fun today," he said. "They play because of the money. It's the high salaries that keep them around."

Ford wins a lot of applause at Amana, but not for golf

IOWA CITY, Iowa (AP) — Former president Gerald Ford won a lot of applause Monday at the Amana VIP Tournament but not for his golf play.

Ford, who told reporters afterward that his game "wasn't very good," had a large following at Finkbine Field Golf Course. Cries of "Hi Jerry" and "Go get 'em Prez" plus outstretched hands greeted him at every hole.

The well-tanned ex-president, wearing a red knit shirt and plaid pants, joked with the crowd about his game. And the spectators, who seemed split between sympathy and amusement at each Ford dub, had some one-liners of their own:

1st Hole
As Ford chipped over the green, a woman was overheard to say, "Poor guy, he plays like me!"

5th Hole
Following another grounder blasted off the tee by the former president: "If Ford ever gets it up in the air he's liable to clobber one of his security men."

10th Hole
"He's got a touch like a go-rilla, doesn't he?" chuckled one onlooker after the former president blasted a shot out of the left rough, back across the fairway and into more trouble.

On the same hole, another man commented to his companion. "He's been over here, down there, now he's back over there. I hope you aren't taking lessons from him."

15th Hole
A spectator had a theory for Ford's errors. "There must be some Republicans over

Player, Nichols share Amana top

IOWA CITY, Iowa (AP) — Gary Player said he "putted like a boob" in the U.S. Open, and Bobby Nichols implied — jokingly — that he was the only pro golfer in the field who makes an honest living.

Despite their different routes to this year's V.I.P. tournament, Player and Nichols were richer by \$3,000 apiece for being co-champions here Monday.

"I'm not interested in playing fulltime anymore,"

said Nichols, pro at Firestone in Akron, Ohio. "The rest of these guys are just playing. I'm the only one who has a job."

Nichols and Player each shot six under par 66 in the Iowa "clambake" billed as the richest one-day pro-am anywhere.

Nichols missed a chance for an outright victory when his 8-foot putt for par on the final hole lipped the cup. That dropped him into a tie

Before the group teed off, Ford was presented with a University of Iowa letter sweater. In a short speech, he said he hoped to avoid doing what comedian Bob Hope had accused him of — playing four golf courses at once.

Ford's reputation for wildness preceded him and at least two spectators claimed to have been nicked by his shots. A soft approach shot near the second green beaned a man in the nose, but there were no injuries.

On three holes, Ford outdrove veteran Julius Boros, the professional in Ford's fivesome who shot a 69. His other partners were Dick Heather, a retired business executive from Baltimore, Md.; Walt Fisher of Chicago, Ill., executive vicepresident of the Zenith Radio Corp., and George Foerstner, the president of Amana Refrigeration, Inc., which sponsored
