For contrast, we have the Seattle Mariners, who did almost nothing right on the road Sunday ... and won anyway.

While the Red Sox have been making a runaway of the American League's East Division race, Seattle has been running away with the bottom spot in AL West. But Sunday, the Mariners overcame seven count 'em, seven — errors in recording a 10-8 victory over the Milwaukee Brewers

for their sixth victory in the last seven games.

Shortstop Craig Reynolds made three of the six miscues by the Seattle infield, with one each by second baseman Larry Milbourne, third baseman Bill Stein and first

can get into trouble if you do. Many cases of insecticide poisoning often is passed off as a "bad case of nerves" during planting, so take care. Don Kuhlman, extension entomologist at the University of Illinois, says prolonged handling of toxic products over a 15-20 day planting period could produce blurred vision, headaches, nausea, chest constriction, and pos-sible death. Insecticides as a group are more potent than herbicides. Here are a few safety procedures to cut down the risks in using insecticides, pesticides, and her-bicides: Stay upwind when mixing or pouring pesticides; Avoid inhaling fumes or dust; Wear long-sleeved shirts when handling chemicals: Wear rubber gloves while mixing or pouring; Wear un-vented goggles and other protective clothing as sug-gested by the pesticide label;
