Molitor sparks Tigers

Jim Molitor's grand slam home run in the third inning sparked Carroll Monday night as they downed Breda in first round sectional play, 7-3.

The Bobcats, who finish their season with a respectable 13-8 record, started the game strong, with half of their game hits coming in the first inning.

Joe Wempe started things off for the Bobcats, knocking in Ken Kennebeck on a single to center field. Brian Nieland pulled in Wempe on a single to left field, followed up by another single to center by Bob Wessling to bring in Marty Van Erdewyk.

But the Bobcats' big show in the bottom of the first was no predictor of future performance as they failed to bring in a single run for the remainder of the game.

Two dismal first innings by the Tigers made it look like the contest would be an easy Bobcat win, but Molitor's to-the-fence fly out in left field was an indication of things to come.

When Carroll came up again in the third, still scoreless and trailing by three, Andy Kennebeck's erratic pitching

gave them the chance they needed.

After walking Tracy Buck and striking out Jason Sanford, Kennebeck gave up his first hit of the game to Roger Bock on a single to right field. When Keith Petersen was walked, the bases were loaded with just one out.

Brad Edwards' pop fly to second base gave the Tigers their second out, but they were hardly finished as Molitor slammed the ball far over the left field fence, bringing in three runs plus his own to give Carroll the lead they held for the rest of the contest.

While Breda was able to get eight men on base after the first inning, they couldn't bring any in as the Tigers played near-flawless ball, committing just one error after the opening frame.

Breda's outfield could hardly be blamed for the Carroll win, either, as they committed only two errors during the entire contest.

The Tigers' other three runs all came in the sixth inning.

Scott Forbes started things out with a single, followed by Scott Hackett and Tracy Buck who were both walked by substitute pitcher Mark Buelt.

Sanford, Petersen and Edwards pulled in the first three batters as they each singled to get on base.

With the bases loaded it looked like it might be a replay of the third inning when Molitor came to the plate, but the Bobcats were ready this time, as Molitor's hit to the pitcher turned into a double play on Sanford's force out at home and a quick throw to first to stop Molitor.

Carroll, now 5-14 for the season, will continue their sectional play Wednesday when they face Glidden-Ralston at 8 p.m. in the Carroll Stadium.

LAKE CITY WINS
Lake City took an easy win over Manning in first round sectional play here Monday night, downing the Bulldogs 8-0.

Eagles Scott Johnson and Dave McCauley both had doubles in the lopsided contest as Lake City scored in four of the seven innings.

Nicklaus and Bean marvel at St. Andrews' course

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland (AP) — "If you were going to build a new course, you certainly wouldn't build one like this," said Arnold Palmer.

"If I tried to lay out another course like this one, people would laugh at me and say, 'Call that a golf course?'" said Jack Nicklaus.

"It's a very beautiful laid-out course," said Andy Bean, this year's top U.S. money winner. "You've got to hit a perfect shot to get close."

They were all talking about the Old Course at St. Andrews, cradle of the game and mecca for golfers the world over. On

Wednesday, St. Andrews stages its seventh British Open since World War II and its 22nd since the Open was first played 120 years ago.

Both Nicklaus and Palmer hastened to get the record straight — they weren't guilty of high golfing treason.

"It's a very subtle course — though some people might call it by other names," said Palmer, who played his first Open at St. Andrews 19 years ago. "To play it properly you've got to take a great deal of thought."

"I think it's fabulous," said Nicklaus, who like Palmer is a two-time Open winner. Nicklaus won in 1970, the last time the Open was played here.

"You've got to accept it for what it is — the home of golf."

Some people may say it's the worst course they've seen. It isn't, and I love it," Nicklaus said.

Bean arrived here Sunday after an overnight flight from the United States. Three hours afterwards he made his first acquaintance with the course and shot a 4-under-par 68 in practice.

"I must admit that when I first saw it I thought it was rougher than we expect in the U.S. But the more you play it, the more you learn to respect it," he said.

St. Andrews is a course, windswept most of the time, without trees, with gorse lining the fairways and with hidden sandtraps and undulations to catch the unwary.

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland (AP) — If the fabled old course at St. Andrews happened to lie in the United States, they would plow it up and build a string of condominiums on it.

A lot of golfers would cheer. Traditionalists would weep.

She's hardly a pretty creature, and certainly not a nice one — this stretch of whin and gorse and shot-making agony that lies beside the North Sea, the seat of the Royal and Ancient Club, cradle of the game.

But she's St. Andrews, she's special and she's opening the doors this week to the world's best professional golfers, gathered for the 107th British Open championship.

Bernard Dawin, the great British golf historian, spoke of her in frightening terms but marveled that she was wooed by "a town given wholeheartedly to golf — the butler, baker and candlestick maker."

Thirty-two years ago, slamin' Sammy Snead took one look at her and said, "Back home in Virginia, you wouldn't plant beets on a place like that." He won in 1946 and never came back.

Bob Jones was an American whiz kid of 19 when he first set eyes on the craggy old dame in 1921. He took a 43 for nine holes, blew his stack and told friends, "I don't care if I ever play this course again."

In subsequent years, he fell in love with her, won the British Amateur here for one of the four crowns in his 1930 Grand Slam and became an idol of the local populace.

Tom Watson, the young Kansas City shotmaker with the Tom Sawyer look, got his first view of ancient St. Andrews last weekend prior to defense of his title and admitted he was impressed
