service to increase the num-ber of cows that can take their turns eating at a stall where feed is dispensed electronically throughout most of the day and night. Now, about 40 cows can eat where 30 once ate. Each additional cow fed through each stall reduces the cost of the feeding system per cow, and cows spend less time dawdling, eating their cereal grain and supplement faster if their bowl has a shape similar to their lower iawbone. Researchers theorized that the jawbone shape would allow feed to collect in front of the cow's muzzle where she could gather feed into her mouth faster with less licking, and it worked. Cows ate up to 7.9 ounces of feed per minute from the jawbone-shaped bowl compared to 5.9 ounces per minute from a conven-
