Navatilova faces tough first match at Wimbledon

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Defending champion Martina Navratilova faced a tough first round match today in the Wimbledon women's singles.

In the opening round of women's competition, the 22-year-old Czech-born champion met 20-year-old South African Tanya Harford, who reached the semifinals at the Wimbledon warmup tournaments at Beckenham and Chichester.

"I would have hoped for an easier opening match," said the Dallas-based Navratilova. Harford, from Johannesburg, is ranked 117th in the world and had to prequalify here. She won all her qualifying matches in straight sets and is full of confidence.

"My motto is not to give up until you have lost the final point," said Harford, who has lost more than seven pounds since last Wimbledon.

In the first day of men's singles Monday, a man who described himself as "an horrendous grass court player" caused the biggest upset in the men's singles. Pat DuPre, a 25-year-old Stanford University economics graduate, beat fourth-seeded Vitas Gerulaitis 7-6, 6-3, 3-6, 3-6, 6-3.

"That was my best ever performance on grass," DuPre said. "I have never done a thing on grass before."

Born in Belgium, raised in Birmingham, Ala., but now living in La Jolla, Calif., DuPre had beaten Gerulaitis a number of times as a junior.

"I was not intimidated and I felt he was really vulnerable," he said. "I had nothing to lose and he had everything to lose, so I wasn't at all nervous and decided to play aggressively."

DuPre's aggression paid dividends in the final set when he broke Gerulaitis in the first

game and then attacked his opponent's serve at every opportunity.

New York playboy Gerulaitis stormed from the court after the match and refused to meet reporters.

Meanwhile, John McEnroe, controversial 20-year-old new millionaire of American tennis, believes a new mental approach can help him to the men's singles title which this year carries a prize of \$40,000.

McEnroe, whose path to the final is made easier by the disappearance of Gerulaitis, said: "I didn't really think I had a chance to win the first two years I came here. Now I think I can win — my attitude is very different."

McEnroe, christened "superbrat" by British reporters who have castigated him for his oncourt outbursts, cruised to a 7-5, 6-1, 6-4 win over American left-hander Terry Moor in the first round.

Tigerettes shock Lady Knights

Carroll rallied from a 4-0 deficit and erupted for four runs in the top of the seventh inning here Monday night and went on to shock Kuemper in girls softball, 10-8.

The Tigerettes, coached by Leesa Dettbarn, came into the contest with an 1-9 record and had lost seven in a row. Kuemper entered with a 7-5 mark.

The Lady Knights had taken an 8-6 lead into the seventh as Jane Brenny had a key two-run single in a four run sixth.

But the Tigerettes didn't quit. In the seventh, Janie Petersen and Beth Blohm reached on errors, Brenda Brincks then singled to load the bases and then Gloria Gipson walked to force in the first run.

Deb Hugelback then followed with a two-run single and the final run came home as Gipson scored on a wild pitch.

"The girls deserve a lot of credit. I feel we beat a fine team in Kuemper," Dettbarn noted.

"It took a lot of character for the

team to come back. It was a great team effort," the Carroll coach said.

"Defensively, we came up with some good plays in pressure situations," Dettbarn said. "Individually, Hugelback had some clutch plays at first and had a good game hitting. It was a thrilling win and hopefully, it will be a confidence builder."

"You can't walk 12 batters and have two hit batsmen plus two wild pitches that they scored on and win against anybody," Kuemper coach Bill Henkenius said.

"One mental mistake, an error, opened the door for Carroll in the sixth," added Henkenius.

The Tigerettes got four runs in the sixth as Gipson walked to force in the first tally. Hugelback and Nancy Beck then singled in runs and Gipson scored on a wild pitch.

Trailing 4-0 after three innings, Carroll got their first runs in the fourth as Gipson and Hugelback singled and then Beck walked.

Rhonda Wittrock then walked to force in a run and the second run scored on a single by Kathy Jandt.

Kuemper won the junior varsity game, 21-2, as Gayle Drees was the winning pitcher and Joan Brown hit a home run.

Kuemper is now 9-4, while the young Tigerettes fell to 4-4.

In varsity action Wednesday, Kuemper is at Dayton and Carroll hosts Manning.

The Carroll baseball team should be a happy one today.

The Tigers ended nearly a month of frustration here Monday night, whipping Schleswig, 13-3, in six innings for their first victory of the season after 14 losses.

The Tigers, who will travel to Manning Wednesday, had no trouble with the Hawks.

Carroll got a run in the second, scored 10 more in the third and added single runs in the fourth and sixth innings to end it.

"It was a badly needed win," Tiger head coach Rich Stoffers said. "It's a lot of relief for the kids. The kids deserved to win and they've worked hard all year."

"We're definitely a young team," Stoffers added. "Hopefully this win will give the team some confidence."

Stoffers feel the Tigers' schedule has been a competitive one. "We've played a very competitive schedule and it has made a stronger club out of us and should be a factor when we get into sectional play in July."

"We finally feel we have people in the right positions. We probably have our strongest lineup now," he added.

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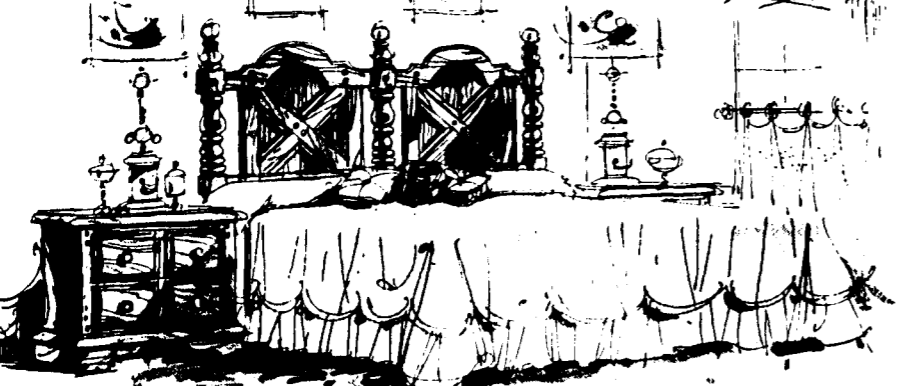
