Nicklaus earns berth on Ryder Cup team

OAK BROOK, III. (AP) - Hale Irwin, Lee Trevino. Weekend performances at the Jerry Pate. Ben Crenshaw Western Open golf tournament earned Jack Nicklaus Bill Rogers and Howard Twitty spots on the 12member U.S. Ryder Cup team headed for England in September.

The team plays in biennial competition against the top 12 British pros.

The three touring pros earned the final three Ryder Cup berths with their performances at the tournament, in which Rogers finished tied for fifth, Nicklaus was tied for seventh and Twitty was far back in the field.

The Western Open was the final chance for the pros to earn points that determine the golfers who make the team.

Already named to the team were Tom Kite, Tom Watson, Ray Floyd, Bruce Lietzke,

and Johnny Miller.

Nicklaus, Twitty and Rogers were tied with Lon Hinkle and Curtis Strange going into the weekend tournament at Butler National Golf Club. Hinkle's bogey on the 17th hole cost him a berth. Strange never challenged.

Nicklaus, who made the team in 1969, 1971, 1973, 1975 and 1977, said the tournament means more in prestige than anything else.

"It's far more important for the guys to make the team than to actually play in it," Nicklaus said.

The Ryder Cup competition is scheduled for Sept. 18-20 at the Walton Head Golf Club in Surrey, England.


