The bluebird is one colorful bird that has made Dickson Timber home. Although other birds are blue, none have the chestnut brown breast of this species. Bluebirds are often attracted to the correct type of nesting box.

The house wren is another bird reported. The house wren is an energetic brown bird smaller than a sparrow, plump and stumpy with a slender bill and a tail often cocked over their back. It is a bird that most bird watchers could view for many hours because it is so energetic and cheerful.

There are many song birds viewed at Dickson Timber. If you are a bird watcher and are looking for a spot in the county to view them, you don't have to look any further. Dickson Timber is the place to go when you are on your next bird watching ad-
