Bird Watching

Swan Lake State Park was a busy place this past 4th of July weekend. The rain on Friday dampened the campgrounds, but not the morale of the campers.

The park received about 1 1/2 inches of rain on Friday, but by Saturday afternoon everyone was pretty well dried out. About 150 camping units were recorded during the weekend. Overall the weekend was quiet with no acts of vandalism reported.

Bird Watching

The Dickson Timber Forest Preserve located two miles east and 3 1/2 miles north of Glidden has been a popular bird watching area this summer. The area is 155 acres of rolling timber which maintains a variety of habitats for many species of song birds.

The bluebird is one colorful bird that has made Dickson Timber home. Although other birds are blue, none have the chestnut brown breast of this species. Bluebirds are often attracted to the correct type of nesting box.

The house wren is another bird reported. The house wren is an energetic brown bird smaller than a sparrow, plump and stumpy with a slender bill and a tail often cocked over their back. It is a bird that most bird watchers could view for many hours because it is so energetic and cheerful.

There are many song birds viewed at Dickson Timber. If you are a bird watcher and are looking for a spot in the county to view them, you don't have to look any further. Dickson Timber is the place to go when you are on your next bird watching adventure.

St. Albert rallies to top Kuemper in 8

Kuemper let a 6-3 lead slip away in the late innings and St. Albert of Council Bluffs wound up taking an 8-7 victory in eight innings here Tuesday night, snapping the Knights' three-game winning streak.

The Falcons, who lost their coach Rick Wahl in the sixth inning when he was kicked out of the game by base umpire Steve Vogel of Churdan for arguing a force out at third base, got their game-winning hit from Steve Johnson who singled home Greg Johnson.

Greg Johnson had led off the eighth with a walk. He stole second and then went to third on a ground out.

The Knights, now 13-11 on the year, took a 7-5 lead into the top of the seventh, but pitcher Dean Steinkamp ran into trouble as Marty Shudak

led off with a double.

After a strikeout, John Wanning singled to put runners at the corners. After Steinkamp got his 10th strikeout, Mike Chevalier singled home one run and the next run scored on a pass ball sandwiched around two walks.

Dennis Scott pitched well in relief to pick up the win. He threw the final three-and-one-third innings and struck out five, while giving up three hits.

After St. Albert cut a three-run deficit to 6-5 in the top of the sixth, the Knights made it

7-5 in their half of the inning as Jim Ericson got his third single of the game. He failed to score as he was thrown out at the plate on a perfect throw from right field, but Scott Cawley did score on a wild pitch.

The Knights got a run in the fifth on a run-scoring single by Jeff Hinners.

Kuemper's big inning was the fourth when they scored three times. Steinkamp and Ericson had run-scoring singles in the frame.

St. Albert, now 19-14 on the year, was led in the batting

department by Wanning who had two hits.

Besides Ericson's three hits, Mike Brincks collected two hits for Kuemper.

Kuemper's next varsity action will be Friday night when they host Albert City-Truesdale, starting with a JV game at 6 p. m.
