Update on fawn

Because so many readers have shown interest, I would like to give you an update on the condition of the white tailed deer fawn that was mentioned in my article two weeks ago.

I am happy to say she is doing well and is being bottle fed at the present time. If you visit Swan Lake in the next few weeks she can be viewed in the bird exhibit building. She is friendly and enjoys visitors.

Opening Bids

If everything goes as planned the commencing of the draining of the lake would take place around the middle of August. During the dewatering, the game fish will be seined from the lake and taken to area lakes.

No game fish have been seined out of the lake so far this summer and there are no plans to do so until the project is approved and the dewatering is taking place.

The Conservation Commission seined for flat head minnows a couple of weeks ago. These minnows are used as feed for game fish being raised in the state fish hatcheries.
